Principal's Message

Dear Parents, Carers and Community Members,

"To accompany others is a sacred task but one that occurs in our daily lives very often. We walk with one another day in and day out. Parents with their children. Spouses with each other. Friends, colleagues, teachers, and even strangers may appear in our lives as companions."

Last week, the staff of St Mary's gathered for our Spirituality Day, with a focus on the theme, <u>Encounter – Journeying Together.</u>

What does it mean – to encounter? Encounter involves a meeting, a person, a feeling, an experience – and it can be different for everyone. What is in common is that we have a **choice** about how we respond to these encounters and how we **value** each one. That is, how do we respond to **each** encounter that we have – **each individual?**

Fr Anthony Gittins speaks of encounter being about **real people in real time** – "To love – you must encounter". As Gittins says, "Jesus didn't love the poor. 'The Poor' is a category. 'The Poor' is an abstraction. 'The Poor' is generic. Instead we are called to love 'a person' – to love the <u>particular</u> and the <u>specific</u>. Encounter must be about **one by one**, just as Jesus did – walking alongside the other." (Gittins, A, 2002)

As we move into Advent and the Christmas season – let's not forget what it means to truly encounter. Let's prepare for it. We must do what Jesus did, making a choice as to how we respond to each encounter. Let's commit to moving beyond the hype of consumerism and the distraction of receiving. Let us, instead be open to the opportunity that encounter brings to us ...

Who do I encounter in my daily life? Who do I give quality time to? Who do I brush off or ignore? Who do I discriminate against or stereotype? Who do I categorise? How do I truly connect to the marginalised, the poor, the broken – not as a category but as individuals? And how can I make a difference or be changed by these encounters? What can I do to be more open to encounter others?

This is the challenge for us as we journey together, encountering both one another, and strangers, in our daily lives. May you each be blessed with the experience of encounter and may you have the courage to respond to each person you meet, with an **act of tangible love**, remembering the words of Jesus,

'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.' Matthew 25: 40


What goals do I have for the coming year?

- 9. Have you taken steps towards researching and planning for life beyond St Mary's? What have you learned so far and how can we help you in this journey?

Year 9 & 10 Additional Courses of Study 2024

Over the course of this term, Ms Flood and I have been meeting with Year 8 students to finalise Additional Courses of Study for 2024. Please note, there are several courses which did not run due to insufficient numbers. Where this has occurred, students have been given their Reserve preferences – using the process that was outlined in communication to parents in Term 3.

Year 8 students will receive formal notification of their 2024/25 subjects in the coming week. In relation to Year 9 students (Year 10 2024), we are not making any changes to patterns of study as we have timetabled and staffed the college, according to choices made by these students in the prior year. While we have been able to accommodate some change requests earlier this term, students were notified by Ms Flood last week that there are no further changes occurring to patterns of study as course numbers are now finalised for the purposes of resourcing and staffing.

Mobile Device Policy Review

Dear Parents, Carers and Students

The St Mary's Catholic College community is guided by the mantra of learning, safety, and respect. In support of St Mary's as a safe and respectful learning community and in response to a growing body of evidence pointing to unregulated mobile device use as having an adverse impact on the social and emotional development of children and young people, we have undertaken a review of our mobile device policy. Our work has been motivated by a sincere desire to nurture healthy social connections between all students in our care and encourage each to develop a positive and balanced relationship with evolving technology.

Current policy settings direct students to keep their mobile devices switched off and in their bags during lesson time. Parents, carers, and staff were surveyed in recent weeks, with the question "Should the expectation of phones being switched off and kept out of sight be extended to the entire school day [8:30 - 3:08] and specifically during break periods?" The response from the community was an emphatic yes. The parent & carer survey [442 responses] yielded a two-thirds majority in the affirmative and over eighty percent of staff [65 responses] agreed that the change would be beneficial with many comments referencing the need to improve the social and emotional safety for the children and young people in our care.

Consequently, a decision has been reached by the College Leadership Team that at the commencement of the 2024 academic year at St Marys Catholic College students will be directed to switch off their phones and store them in their bags for the duration of the school day [8:30 am -3:08 pm]. A detailed policy statement is currently being formulated with input invited by the student body via SPC and Student Leader representatives. I anticipate this will be published to the community prior to the end of the academic year.

I would ask our parents and carers to begin a discussion around the kitchen table as to how this change will impact current communication arrangements within your family unit. To support your child's adherence to the policy in 2024 a few simple alternative communication strategies are listed below:

- Parents wishing to contact their child during the school day should do so via Student Services [4944 4800 / Madmin@gatesheadsm.catholic.edu.au]
- Students wishing to contact a parent or carer should do so via Student Services
- Communication via email during the school day is encouraged.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank and acknowledge the work of the College Wellbeing Team for their efforts throughout the process and sincerely thank the many parents and carers who contributed meaningfully to the discussion via the survey. I look forward to working with each of you in support of you in your role as a parent and primary educator. Wishing you and your family a very safe and festive Christmas season.

A letter to Year 10 Parents/Carers



27 November 2023

Dear Parent/Carer

As you will be aware, the NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) introduced a Minimum Standards prerequisite for students studying the HSC. NESA requires students to meet this standard in the following three areas: **Reading, Writing and Numeracy**, before they receive their HSC. The tests are administered online and to support your child, as they work towards achieving this standard, we have already held two testing sessions this year.

In 2023 we are offering final testing sessions on Monday 4 December and Thursday 7 December. This will allow students a second opportunity to sit tests in the Domains needed. Each test will run for 45 minutes. The Reading and Numeracy tests will include 45 multiple choice questions and the Writing test will require your child to respond to a question based on a prompt or stimulus.

Please note, your son/daughter was sent an email last week notifying them of those tests that needed to be attempted to complete the suite of Minimum Standards. If your child has been diagnosed with a learning, sensory or physical disability, he/she will be able to access disability provisions to provide a fair opportunity to respond to the online literacy and numeracy tests. Should you need further help in understanding the process, please click on the following link to see what the tests look like.

Finally, if your child is unable to attend these catch-up sessions, <u>students will have further opportunities in Year 11</u> 2024 to reach the Minimum Standards as part of our assessment processes.

A letter to Parents/Carers of Years 7 to 10



23 November 2023

Dear Parents and Carers,

St Mary's Catholic College has provided three reports on your child's progress this year. This process of reporting and providing meaningful feedback to students and parents, is an integral part of teaching and learning at the college. Reporting opportunities provide information both formally and informally about the process of student learning and achievement.

Semester Two Reports will be available for access in Week 8 (Year 10) and Week 10 (Years 7 – 9). This report is **summative** in nature. It contains a series of statements relating to the student's **Approaches to Learning (Behaviour, Diligence and Engagement)**, as well as achievement of several learning outcomes, as seen in the **Course Learning Profiles**. These Learning Profiles have been assessed by individual teachers based on teacher professional judgement, using the <u>Common Grade Scale</u> as a guide, and the evidence collected through both formative and summative assessment. Profiles are rated using one of the following descriptors: Extensive, Thorough, Sound, Basic, Elementary.

A **Course Grade** has also been completed by class teachers as a summation of student achievement overall in the course. The Course Grade is based on grade descriptions contained within the Common Grade Scale and matches the standards that students have achieved at a particular point-in-time. The grade is awarded by the teacher based on evidence of achievement collected during the teaching and learning process.

In addition to the Semester Report, students have received consistent feedback from class teachers in relation to individual tasks completed. Hence, as these reports are essentially summative, there is not a teacher comment included on this Semester Two Report. In 2023 we have sought to be proactive in contact with parents, providing an additional (and early) report in the form of the Term One Interim Report. These reports were followed by early Parent/Student teacher interviews, enabling the establishment of early partnerships. At the end of Semester One a full report, with Teacher Comments and a second opportunity for interviews has also been provided. This final Semester Two Report provides a summation of achievement for the year, as addressed earlier in this communication.

Finally, Awards Ceremonies will be held on the following days for students in Year 7 - 10:

Year 10 Wednesday 6th December Week 9 (commencing 9.30am)

Years 7 – 9 Wednesday 13th December Week 10 (Whole College Liturgy period 1; Year 7 period 2, Year 8 period 3, Year 9 period 4)

Parents and Carers are invited to attend the Awards Ceremonies, being held in The Josephite Centre.























Cultural Sessions

REMINDER — **SCHOOL FEES**: Fees are to be finalised by 30 November for 2023 unless a fee agreement is current. If you have any concerns, please contact the Finance Office as soon as possible to establish a mutual arrangement. Those parents/carers with current fee agreements may continue as per their arrangement with the Principal.

Please note: If required, all existing fee agreements must be renegotiated for 2024, please make an appointment early Term 1, 2024.

All statements are generated and emailed during the first week of every month. Please ensure emails from the College do not go directly to your spam account. It is your responsibility to ensure you receive the statement. If you are not receiving statements, or you wish to update your email address, please contact the Finance Office.

If you are making payments by regular instalments, please ensure that these payments are adequate to finalise the fees by 30 November 2023.

In addition, if you are the holder of a 'means tested' low-income Health Care/Pension Card, you are eligible for a further reduction off the Tuition Fee component. Please ensure the Finance Office has sighted your card at the commencement of each school year and the accompanying forms are completed, to enable us to apply this discount.

DIO GOLF DAY


The Dio Golf day was recently held at Pacific Dunes Golf Course in Medowie.
