

NAPLAN 2024

Dear Parents and Carers of Students in Years 7 & 9,

Once again, it is time to prepare for NAPLAN testing and both Years 7 and 9 will be partaking in the NAPLAN tests commencing **Wednesday 13th March until Monday 18th March**. These dates are earlier than usual as a result of a decision made by Australia's education ministers in 2022, to ensure results were in the hands of parents and teachers earlier in the school year, enabling earlier intervention and planning for all students in their learning.



Should students 'prepare' for NAPLAN?

The <u>latest NAPLAN information brochure for parents and carers</u> prepared by the Australian Curriculum and Assessment Authority (ACARA) stresses that students are not expected to study for NAPLAN. ACARA also does not recommend excessive preparation for NAPLAN "or the use of services by coaching providers".

"You can support your child by reassuring them that NAPLAN is a part of their school program and reminding them to simply do their best," the factsheet says. Please take the time to read the information brochure and familiarise yourself with what is involved. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the NAPLAN test site.

In 2024 our students will sit NAPLAN tests in - **Reading, Writing, Conventions of Language and Numeracy.** Please see below for the timetable:

Our students will sit these online tests on their own devices. As a result, <u>every student in Years 7 and 9 will need to ensure that they have their devices with them and that these are charged.</u> Students will also need to bring a pair of earphones each day.

PLEASE NOTE:

- Chromebooks are not supported by the Locked Down Browser required to undertake the NAPLAN tests. Students with Chromebooks will be required to complete the tests on a school owned device.
- All students will be required to download/update the latest version of the Locked Down Browser prior to the day of their NAPLAN Practice tests. Information regarding this process will be emailed to students.

Disability Provisions

Students with a diagnosed disability can apply for provisions for NAPLAN.

- Small Groups Supervision (Support Person) a member of the Learning Support team will be allocated to provide support to the group, for example, encouragement, prompting, and reading instructions (but not testing materials).

Assessment & Reporting at St Mary's

Assessment is the broad name for the collection and evaluation of evidence of a student's learning. It is integral to teaching and learning and has multiple purposes. Assessment can enhance student engagement and motivation, particularly when it incorporates interaction with teachers, other students, and a range of resources.

NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA)

Years 7, 8 and 9 (Stage 4 and early Stage 5)

Assessment in Years 7 - 9 is **formative in nature** and is **centred on student growth**. Evidence of learning includes a variety of tasks, for, as and of learning, that are collated throughout the year by the classroom teacher AND the student (eg portfolio; process diary; learning log.) Compass Learning Tasks or TEAMS Assignments are also utilised by some teachers to provide relevant and timely feedback to students and parents in the learning process.

A Formal Assessment Schedule is published by the college ONLY for students in Year 9 who are undertaking 100 Hour RoSA (Record of School Achievement) Courses. This Stage 5 Handbook will be available in the school portal by Week 6 this term. Tasks will also appear on the Compass Calendar – students can subscribe to this calendar.

For Years 7 & 8 students, individual teachers will manage formative and summative assessment within each faculty and, as such, an **Assessment Handbook is not printed for these students.**

At the end of each semester a report is issued identifying an overall level of achievement for each subject studied based on the **Common Grade Scale**. These Grades are awarded to each student based on the evidence collected throughout the learning process. Performance is measured against descriptors for A - E in that subject. Teachers collaborate in this process in professional learning teams.

Year 10 (Stage 5 Assessment)

In Year 10, assessment is still largely formative with **no more than TWO formal summative assessment tasks** completed by each subject in Year 10 per year. These two tasks per subject appear in the **Stage 5 Assessment Handbook** and **Formal Task Notifications** are issued to students at least two weeks in advance. These two formal tasks contribute to the awarding of Grades for the Stage 5 RoSA but are **NOT the only evidence used to determine grades for the students.** The gradual introduction of these formal Summative Tasks leads students towards an understanding of the nature and requirements of Stage 6 assessment.

The assessment and reporting principles outlined above will also apply for Stage 4.

For **Years 9 and 10 RoSA Courses** Grades A – E will be awarded for ROSA and submitted to NESA at the conclusion of the academic year.

NB There are no exam blocks scheduled for 2024 for Years 7 - 9. With longer lesson length, subjects may choose to complete assessment of student achievement in the longer periods. Students in Year 10 may be required to sit a formal examination at the end of the year for some subjects. **The Formal Examination Block will be held in Week 4 Term 4.**

Years 11 and 12 Stage 6

As per NESA requirements, there are mandatory components and weightings for the Year 11 and Year 12 courses. The maximum number of formal assessment tasks is THREE in Year 11 and FOUR in Year 12, with only ONE task being a formal examination in Year 11 and Year 12.

- Year 11 Maximum THREE Formal Tasks (ONE exam only).
- Year 12 Maximum FOUR Formal Tasks (ONE exam only).

The Year 11 Mid-Course and End of Course Report contains an A-E descriptor against achievement of outcomes and a Cumulative Assessment RANK in Course. Year 11 students receive a Grade A-E based on the <u>Common Grade Scale for Preliminary Courses</u>. These grades are then submitted to NESA as part of the RoSA accreditation process.

The Year 12 Mid-Course and End Of Course Reports contain an A-E descriptor against achievement of outcomes and a Cumulative Assessment RANK in Course. HSC Internal Assessment Marks are submitted to NESA each year in September.

All Years 9 – 10 students will SOON have access to their 2024 Assessment Handbooks via the Student Portal under Assessment. Year 11 & 12 Handbooks are already available. The handbooks contain all Assessment Schedules, calendars, and due dates/weeks for our students.

Formal Assessment Dates are also visible on the Compass Calendar for students.

On **Thursday 27 February Year 11 students participated in a in a "Study Skills and Induction to Stage 6 Day" at the College.** The Year 11 students rotated through a program which included four sessions comprising of the following: <u>An Introduction to NESA and studentsonline</u> (Mrs O'Gorman); <u>Well Being and Life Balance Workshop</u> (Mr Beckett); <u>Learning Strategies</u> (Ms Morag Aitchison & Mrs Tracy Carpenter) and <u>Planning Future Pathways</u> (Ms Paula Finlay).

These sessions were aimed to assist in preparing our students for their Preliminary and HSC years, providing them with the opportunity to reflect on their first few weeks of Stage 6, their approach to study and their setting of goals moving forward.

Students are to be commended for their engagement in the day and we encourage all Year 11 students to use the skills learned. In the coming days, students will also receive their Mentors and we look forward to supporting our Year 11 students as they make their way through Preliminary Course work. Steady, small steps, enable progress and growth as a senior student. Parents and carers, your support of us in our endeavours to set good habits and practices, is appreciated! A huge thank you to Mrs Carpenter, Mr Beckett, Ms Aitchison and Ms Finlay for their time and support of Year 11 on this day.

Please find attached leaflet containing a URL and a QR code to all Year 7 and Year 10 parents to access the online Parent Information, privacy statement and consent form.

To consent to the vaccination of their child, parents/guardians are asked to:

- Enter the URL into your browser, select the School Vaccination Program tile and follow instructions.
- read all the information provided
- complete the online consent form and give consent for which vaccine/s they would like their child to receive
- ensure that their child eats breakfast on the day of the school vaccination clinic.

To improve vaccination completion, students whose parents/guardians have provided consent while in Year 7 or Year 10 and who miss vaccine doses at any clinic, will be opportunistically offered these vaccines at each clinic visit throughout 2024 (Year 7 or 10) & 2025 (Year 8 or 11).

Parents/guardians who wish to withdraw their consent for any reason may do so by amending their student's online consent. The Procedure for Withdrawal of Consent is available on the NSW Health website at http://www.health.nsw.gov.au/immunisation/Pages/withdraw_consent.aspx



A Record of Vaccination will be provided to parents by SMS once a student has been vaccinated. Parents/guardians should not assume that their child has been vaccinated if they do not receive this SMS notification.

I hope this message finds you well. Following recent discussions and feedback, we are pleased to announce significant enhancements to our Student Council's structure and operational framework. Our aim is to further empower our students by amplifying their voices, fostering leadership, and enhancing their sense of agency within our College community.

New Structure for Enhanced Representation

Starting this year, our Student Council will adopt a new form that mirrors the inclusive and representative structure of our College Student Leadership team. Specifically, one boy and one girl form each roll call in Years 8-11 will be elected to form the Student Council.

The Importance of Your Support

The success of this initiative is greatly dependent on the encouragement and support from our entire College community, especially from you, the parents, and guardians. We believe that every student has the potential to be a leader, and we are committed to nurturing this potential. We kindly ask for your support in discussing the value of student leadership and participation in the Student Council with your children. Encouraging them to nominate themselves or support their peers in nominations can make a significant difference in their confidence and willingness to take on leadership roles.

Student Council 2024: Roles and Nomination Process

The Student Council plays an important role in our college Community. Council members are responsible for amplifying the student voice, representing their peers' interests and concerns, facilitating communication between the student body and college administration, and leading initiatives that contribute to the College's spirit and goals. This year, the nomination process has been streamlined for ease and accessibility. Students have the opportunity to nominate themselves or be nominated by their teachers. The nomination period opens on Wednesday, 28th February, and closes on Monday, 4th March, with applications submitted via a FORMS link on Compass. The QR code for the Forms link is also attached to this article.

Operational Changes for Enhanced Engagement

To adapt to the needs of our students and maximise their participation, the Student Council will transition away from meeting during roll call times. The council will operate primarily via a Teams page, encouraging regular engagement and facilitating communication within and across year groups. Full council meetings will occur once per term with smaller groups meeting fortnightly during lunch times to ensure effective collaboration and mentorship across year groups. E.g. Members in roll calls 1,2 and 3 meet lunchtime Wednesday Week A. Members in 4, 5 and 6 meet lunchtime Wednesday Week B – TBC.

Reminder Letter for Unexplained Absences

Parents/carers will receive a reminder letter on a weekly basis indicating when their child has been absent from school without us receiving an explanation. An explanation can be given via the Compass, by email or by giving Student Services a call, within 7 days of receipt. In accordance with the Attendance Policy, explanations received after 7 days will remain unexplained.



Updated Application Forms

Updated application forms have been introduced for students which cover:

- Extended Leave (Travel), Exemption from Attendance at School (Elite Sport/Elite Arts/Employment in the
 Entertainment Industry) or Exemption from Enrolment at School form (one form covers all options). The old
 A1/A2 forms have now been discontinued and will no longer be considered if submitted. The Extended
 Leave form is required to be completed for absences 10 days or more.
- Completion of Year 10 via a Certificate II at TAFE NSW form.
- Employment in the Entertainment Industry form.

The ASPIRE Concert Band is a Diocesan ensemble for students in Years 5-12. It is suitable for students who can at least play at a 1st grade (AMEB) level as well students of a more advanced ability, 4th grade (AMEB) and above. The ensemble is not suitable for beginner students.

Instruments include: Flute, clarinet, oboe, bassoon, bass clarinet, saxophone, trumpet, trombone, french horn, euphonium, tuba, mallet/auxiliary percussion and drum kit. The band is not suitable for string or piano players.

Students must know how to read traditional music notation.

The concert band will be playing a variety of repertoire including traditional concert band music, music from television and film, rock and pop music and music specifically composed for concert bands. There will be performances and events the concert band will be part of.

WHEN ARE REHEARSALS?

There will be 3 rehearsal per term (total of 11 hours per term):

- 2 regional rehearsals (Central and Upper Hunter)
- 1 whole day rehearsal at St Pius X High School Adamstown

REGIONAL REHEARSAL:

You will be able to attend rehearsals at your closest school:

- · St Pius X High School Adamstown
- St Catherine's Catholic College Singleton

These rehearsals will be after school hours, 4.00 pm - 6.00 pm and will only involve the students from that area.

WHOLE DAY REHEARSAL:

There will be one full day rehearsal each term held at St Pius X High School, Adamstown. All students are to attend this rehearsal.


HOW MUCH DOES IT COST?
