Principal's Message

Dear Parents, Carers and Community Members

"Be Compassionate, As God is Compassionate" (Luke 6:36)

What does being compassionate, as God is compassionate demand of us as Catholic School Educators?

Borg M. "Meeting Jesus again for the first time" (1995 P.49) states that "to be compassionate as God is compassionate is to feel as God feels, and to act as God acts: in a life-giving and nourishing way". Borg also recognises that "for Jesus' compassion was more than a quality of God and an individual virtue: it was a social paradigm, the core value of life in community".

If compassion is to be, and must be, a core value of life in our community, then our relationships must be life-giving, affirming, nourishing and caring. Furthermore, we must honour our obligation as Christian educators to witness to, educate and empower our adolescents to practise the law of love. Hence, we must educate them to understand and deeply appreciate, that our love of God is realised by loving our neighbours as ourselves.

According to Thomas Groome, "What Makes Education Catholic – Spiritual Foundations" (2021 p.181), this demands that "a Catholic school must be a place that practises and includes opportunities for students to practise the compassion and justice demanded by Christian faith within its curriculum."

It is deeply satisfying to witness and learn that this is integral to our daily practice in our community and that the law of love is being practised by both students and staff. The Push-Up Challenge conducted last week (see Mrs Murray's account in this Newsletter), was yet another wonderful example of our students being compassionate as God is compassionate. Led by our Year 12's, fellow students and staff shared in the Push-Up Challenge in support of people suffering from mental illnesses.

The significance of the challenge was that it resulted from our Year 12 students drawing upon their own life experiences and working collaboratively to pursue an initiative reflecting love of neighbour and their commitment to works of compassion and social justice, that contribute to the goal of alleviating the suffering of those with mental illness.

The challenge was truly a life-giving, nourishing and caring activity. It demonstrated students' and staff members' commitment to embracing a living faith committed to compassion and justice. All concerned are sincerely commended and thanked on their commitment to being compassionate as God is compassionate.

Push Up Challenge at St Mary's Push for better mental health.

Wednesday the 15th June was one of those warmer winter days where the sun was shining and there was not a cloud in the sky. Perfect conditions to pump out hundreds of push ups.

The positive vibe on the playground was evident and the sense of community spirit that exists at our school led to one hundred or so students and about 30 staff doing their best to raise money for Lifeline, the recipient organisation of this year's fund raising from the Push Up Challenge.

The Push up challenge comes directly from 'The push for better' foundation. Their aim is to PUSH for change and to engage and educate people in mental and physical health and raise awareness of the mental health issues affecting everyday Australians. Mental health is a huge concern for our society and for way too long a stigma has existed which has forced people to keep quiet about their own struggles with their mental health. This has the potential to cause even greater problems for the individual, their family and in turn society as a whole.

NSW government data shows that in January 2021 alone – 104 people committed suicide – that is an increase from 81 in January 2020. One in seven young people aged 4 to 17 experience a mental health condition in any given year. Over 75% of mental health problems occur before the age of 25.

The photos captured the lunchtime fun and the teams involved shows the commitment to raising funds to support organisations that are trying to support those who face physical and mental health challenges. We raised \$600 from the one hour of Push Ups.

 number of the participants during the lunchtime challenge Well done!












Year 7 Formation Day – Tuesday June 14th, 2022 at Point Wolstoncroft


It is Snowtime!


