# Principal's Message

Dear Parents, Carers and Community Members

### The Role of Mistakes in Making a Success of us all

This week our Year 12 students commenced their trial Higher School Certificate examinations. It is a time of critical preparation for their final examinations. A time when they learn from their mistakes and identify "gaps" in their learning. Learning from mistakes must be recognised as a normal, but necessary, part of the process of learning for ALL students.

Unfortunately, the curse of perfection has led to too many people being shamed by mistakes and, as a consequence, fear making mistakes and failing. Yet, all of us make mistakes and experience failure in our daily lives precisely because we are imperfect.

We must see and we must educate our children to see our imperfection as a gift. This is so because it grants each of us the opportunity to grow, to develop and to learn from our mistakes and failures.

Studies in the fields of Neuroscience and Psychology continue to demonstrate that making mistakes enhances students' ability to problem solve; to think critically and to analyse their work. It also triggers brain growth, builds their intelligence and teaches them to become more resilient in the face of failure and life's challenges.

Our students must develop the skills needed to become reflective, independent, life-long learners. Making mistakes in the learning process is crucial to developing these much needed qualities for life beyond school.

As educators (parent and teacher) of adolescents, we have a shared responsibility to educate our children/students to value their mistakes as something to be embraced and learn from. We must work together to take mistake-making from a position of shame to one that our adolescents seize upon as an opportunity for learning, growing and becoming the best of themselves.

Learning from mistake-making is a stepping-stone to success in life. It is good to remind our adolescents that without making mistakes all we have is "UNTRIED" ability. A wasted opportunity to find out more about ourselves and life.

#### Year 10 - Stage 6 2023 Course Selections

Following the second WebChoice survey of student Course Preferences, Year 10 students, have been finalising subject choices for 2023. Over the coming weeks, **Ms Finlay** and **myself** will continue to speak with students regarding concerns re choices or options. Our role is to find solutions for each student as best as we can within the constraints of the 2023 timetable. Students will receive a Letter of Confirmation regarding subjects prior to the Senior interview, held in Term 4.

#### **Year 8 – Stage 5 Additional Studies**

This week, students in Year 8 have been engaging in the **2023 Additional Courses of Study Process**. Students have had several gatherings to talk through the subject options as well as receiving an Additional Courses of Study 2023 Handbook. A Parent Information PowerPoint has also been emailed via student email for further support when making selections. Students will make choices in the following week and I encourage parents/carers to engage in conversation with their children in relation to these selections. This is a significant milestone in each child's education as it is the first time they have had choice in their pattern of study. Given the COVID situation and our inability to hold a parent evening, I encourage anyone with questions to email **myself**, **Ms Katrina Brennan** (Year 8 Leader of Wellbeing), Leaders of Learning or classroom teachers as needed.

#### Learning Walks & Talks at St Mary's

This term, the teachers at St Mary's, under the guidance of our Pedagogical Mentor, Ms Georgina Lindsay, have recommenced Learning Walks and Talks, visiting classrooms with a focus on *our students and their understanding of their learning - student self-efficacy*.

Travelling in small teams, teachers are visiting classrooms, observing the learning taking place and asking students the following questions:

What are you learning?
Why are you learning it?
How are you going?
How do you know?
How can you improve?
Where do you go for help?

You are encouraged, as partners in your child's education, to ask these questions of your child when you have the opportunity – to support students as they take greater ownership of their learning and move towards greater independence and autonomy.

A copy of the St Mary's protocol designed for the LWTs is shared with you below:

It was a case of many hands make light work with 70 students volunteering. We removed huge areas of Morning Glory weed.










It was a great opportunity for students to reconnect with nature in a beautiful outdoor learning environment!
