Principal's Message

Dear Parents, Carers and Community Members,

"Leadership is about people in everyday settings, whether or not holding positions of power, working together on common goals."

(MacBeath et al Strengthening the Connections between Leadership and Learning, 2018 p88)

When **leadership** is understood in terms of collaborative action or practice, rather than a formal position of responsibility or power, then colleagues work together as equals. As a learning community, all teachers at St Mary's, regardless of formal roles or positions, are committed to working alongside each other as **teacher leaders**, as they seek to develop practice and knowledge. In our daily interactions, and structured Professional Learning Meetings, we, as colleagues, share expertise, passion, questions, failures and successes. It is in this state, where teachers move between being both *learners and leaders* of learning, that self-efficacy, skills and knowledge are developed.

Most importantly, as learners, teachers and leaders, we seek to model what we ask of our students- that they, too, are able to act as both *learners AND leaders of learning - together*.

In her 2023 research, Susan Lovett explored the concept of teacher leadership:

"Teachers who share insights and questions of practice with each other demonstrate a professional maturity which intersects with and is manifest through leadership actions. Their sharing of influence can benefit others as well as provide satisfactions at a personal level, when learning is a mutual activity made in the interests of students and their learning." (Leading & Managing Vol29, No 1, 2023 p3)

"When teachers engage in shared conversations with colleagues in the flow of daily practice, their reciprocal dialogue creates the impetus for actions which can be undertaken together." (Leading & Managing Vol29, No 1, 2023 p6)

This concept, of teachers leading each other in best practice, underpins the model for learning at St Mary's. As you are aware, each fortnight teachers come together to collaborate in Professional Learning Meetings. Here teachers share in leading their colleagues, through direct instruction and collaborative practice, in areas such as Literacy, Writing, Numeracy, assessment strategies, critical and creative thinking strategies, technology and data analysis. In Faculty Meetings, teachers act as leaders sharing expertise, resources, pedagogy, data and evidence, all the while seeking feedback, solving problems and answering questions about their own practice – and their students' learning. In Learning Teams, before and after school, teachers lead each other in Case Managements Meetings, developing professional learning content for their colleagues, writing units of work collaboratively, and benchmarking.

As staff at St Mary's, and in one with our mantra - Be Safe Be Respectful Be a Learner — we are committed to lifelong learning and a growth mindset.

Further, it is this mindset, and the concept of leadership as "collaborative action", that we seek to develop in our students - where ALL students are **leaders of learning**; where all students can collaborate in a dynamic, thriving learning environment; where it is safe to ask questions, seek solutions and learn together; where the sharing of one's self – skills, gifts and knowledge – is an act of service to the other. This is the learning community we seek to be, one that learns and leads together.

UPDATE - BOB SHERIDAN'S BIKE ODYSSEY – CEDUNA (SA) TO YANCO (NSW)

Since leaving Ceduna, Bob has journeyed 1500km to Yanco. The following is Bob's account of that journey:

"Hi Larry

A lot has happened in 2 weeks. The weather is now freezing cold in the morning and doesn't warm up until midday. The coldest start was -3° and max out at 9°. Still I rug up and go. One day I did 213kms. A very cold start but it warmed up and there was a beautiful wind blowing at my back.

In 2 weeks, I've travelled from Ceduna in South Australia to Yanco in NSW. 1500ks. I've crossed the SA Victoria border at Renmark and the Victoria NSW border at Mildura. I've now travelled across all mainland states and the NT. On Wednesday traveling across the Hay Plains from Hay to Darlington Point was probably my toughest day. A real challenge. It was pea soup thick fog, very cold and I felt very lonely. I got through this by recalling all the support I received along the way especially from the SMCCG community. Days like this test resilience and determination.

I taught at YAHS in the 80s and it's great to come back here. On Thursday 2 students I taught rode with me from DP to the school - an honour to ride with them. On arrival at school, I was invited to speak at the assembly. On Friday I did seminars with all year groups talking about Bob Sheridan's Bike Odyssey. On Monday and Tuesday, I'm riding to west Wyalong with students I taught.

It's coming to an end now and it's all a bit surreal. I'm getting ready for the return to Newcastle on Sunday August 13. If anyone wants to join me (staff and students) to ride for part of the last day then send me a message. I would be honoured to for this to happen.

This will be my last update. I thank everyone for supporting me along the way. Cheers Bob Sheridan"



The Final Stages of Bob's Odyssey

As I pen this article on Wednesday, 2 August, Bob is "on the road again" cycling from West Wyalong to Parkes, his mother's home town; where he will be reunited with family members and rest in their company for a day. He will then cycle to Dubbo where he will also rest in the company of family members and re-connect with other cyclists, who he has cycled with on the "Zoo to Zoo" ride, and who will ride with him to Newcastle.

Bob plans to be in Gulgong on Friday, 11 August; Denman on Saturday, 12 August and commence the final stage of his remarkable Odyssey from Denman to Newcastle early in the morning of Sunday 13 August arriving at Nobby's Beach about lunch time.

A Bike Odyssey becoming a transforming Odyssey of Hope

On 11 April, 2023, Bob embarked on a bike odyssey that over the next 4 months would see him cycling approximately 11,100 kilometres. It is a truly remarkable personal achievement however it is important to understand that Bob did not embrace the adversity, pain, suffering and struggle demanded of him during the past 4 months to satisfy his ego. His goal has always been, and continues to be, to help others. He has fully internalised that meaning in life comes out of what we do for others. He understands, ever so deeply, that our prime purpose in life is to help others.


Bob has embraced his bike odyssey to raise funds to help people who, like himself, have suffered or are suffering with issues of mental health. He was scarred and tormented by the abuse he suffered as a young student at school. He has had to deal with and endure the deep emotional pain and shame of it. In his struggle he has had the support and comfort of family and friends and the staff at the Black Dog Institute (BDI). This has enabled him to find the "limitless boundaries of his new, strong self." It has enabled him to be liberated from suffering. He has not given in to victimhood, to bitterness, despondency, or despair, and has not settled for less than the fully alive person he has meant to be and has come to be. A person who is giving back to those who have provided invaluable assistance in liberating him from the trauma of his past.


Bob's act in giving back, by undertaking a bike odyssey, has in fact become an ODYSSEY OF HOPE. There are lessons here for each of us. We all struggle in life. There is no life without struggle. Struggle demands that we make a choice we either give into the pain of it and remain entrapped in the past or, like Bob, we make a choice to depth the wellspring of our inner being and move forward in life and become the fully alive person we are meant to be.

We have had the opportunity to learn so much about life, our humanness, and the beauty of our natural environment by sharing in and reflecting on Bob's accounts of his experiences "on the road". I'm certain you join with me in expressing our sincere gratitude and heartfelt thanks to him for giving so much of himself for the good and care of others. He IS a true servant of human goodness, a beacon of hope for those trapped in the darkness of their emotional hurt, pain, and deep sense of shame. His struggle should be a reminder to each of us that no matter the depth of the struggle there is a capacity for endurance in the human heart.


ASSISTANT PRINCIPAL – LEARNING & TEACHING

BOUNCING BACK



How to Bounce Back from a Disappointing Assignment Mark

We've all been there – eagerly awaiting the results of an assignment we thought we had slayed, only to be disheartened by a disappointing mark. It's completely normal to feel down at first but remember, setbacks are opportunities for growth and improvement. Here are some steps you can take to handle a disappointing assignment mark and turn it into a learning experience:

1. Analyse and Understand the Feedback:

When you receive your assignment back, take the time to review the feedback provided by your teacher.

Ask yourself the following questions:

- Did you meet all the criteria outlined in the assignment?
- What specific feedback did your teacher provide?
- Do you fully comprehend the feedback given?
- Can you identify the reasons behind the mark you received?

If you're unsure about any aspect of the feedback, don't hesitate to ask your teacher for further clarification. Understanding where you went wrong is crucial to avoid repeating the same mistakes in the future.

2. Choose to Accept or Challenge:

- Seek Inspiration: Ask your teacher if you can examine assignments from students who received top grades. Analyse their work to understand what elements contributed to their success and identify areas where your assignment fell short.
- Seek Early Feedback: For your next assignment, share your plan or draft with your teacher before the submission deadline. This proactive approach allows you to receive valuable feedback early on, giving you ample time to make improvements.



Monday 23 October 2023

INSTRUMENTAL AUDITION

Monday 23 October 2023

All instrumental auditions are 10 minutes. You are required to prepare a short piece that you feel shows your ability. After performing your piece for the panel, you will either be given some sight reading, then asked to perform some scales or asked to improvise around some chords accompanied by another instrument.

DRAMA AUDITION

Tuesday 24 October and Wednesday 25 October 2023

The drama auditions are comprised of a half hour workshop comprising of a series of drama exercises in movement, voice, character work and devising (creating short scenes). Students will also be required to prepare a short one-minute monologue. A list of topics for Junior applicants will be on the ASPIRE website from Week 7 of Term 3, whilst Senior applicants will be required to source a monologue of their choice.

VOCAL AUDITION

Thursday 26 October 2023

For the one-hour vocal audition, you will be placed in a group of up to 20 students of similar age. The first part of the audition will comprise learning a new song as a group and some simple movement to go with it. This allows us to see how well you pick up new music, lyrics and movement and place them together, but it will also be fun! In the second half of the audition everyone will be required to sing the first verse and chorus of one of the ten selected songs. 
Year 9 News

Year 9 Olympian Presentation

Last Tuesday Matthew Gray, 3-time Olympic Archer, spoke to Year 9 about goal setting and how to achieve their goals through hard work, perseverance, organisation and focus. He spoke to them about his 3 Olympic campaigns and the reasons for his successes and failures and passed around his Commonwealth Gold Medal. 
