Principal's Message

Dear Parents, Carers and Community Members

As emerging technologies such as artificial intelligence (AI) become more prevalent, our school is committed to developing principles to guide the safe, effective, and responsible use of these tools for student learning. Having recently attended the 2023 Annual Conference of the Australian Council for Educational Leaders, it has become increasingly clear to me that the role Artificial Intelligence will play, in the context of education, is rapidly increasing – bringing with it both great potential for positive impact on learning but also complex ethical dilemmas. Further, the Australian Academic Integrity Network (AAIN) identifies "the need for sustainable and adaptable responses to generative AI in learning, teaching and assessment and academic integrity policies and procedures," demanding a proactive approach to managing these new technologies.

In this newsletter I would like to explore the role of AI in education and share our efforts, here at St Mary's, to create guidelines to ensure its responsible and effective use within our school community.



The Promise of AI in Education

Artificial Intelligence, a branch of computer science that deals with the creation of intelligent machines, is already transforming the educational landscape. Al has the potential to provide personalised learning experiences, streamline administrative tasks, and support teachers in their instructional efforts. Its applications are numerous, including adaptive learning systems that adjust to students' individual needs, chatbots to provide instant assistance, and data analytics to enhance educational outcomes. It also has the potential, **if used wisely**, to transform the learning experiences and understanding for students. By embracing Al, we can make education more efficient, engaging, and effective as we prepare our students for study and work after school, of which Al will be a prominent part. In doing so, however, we must move forward with deep consideration of the responsibilities and ethics involved when using these technologies.

Developing AI Guidelines for Our School

To harness the benefits of AI while **mitigating potential risks**, we have initiated the development of guidelines for its use within our school. These guidelines will provide a framework for the responsible and ethical use of AI, ensuring that the well-being of our students and the integrity of our educational programs remain paramount.

Our goals for these guidelines include:

- Ensuring Student Privacy: We are committed to safeguarding the privacy and security of our students. The guidelines will address data collection, storage, and sharing to protect our students' information.
- Transparency and Accountability: Al algorithms can be complex, but we will work to ensure transparency in their use and establish accountability for any decisions made by Al systems.
- Effective Educational Practices: Al should support, not replace, teachers. The guidelines will encourage Al's role in enhancing our educational practices and offering additional resources for both educators and students.
- Equity and Inclusivity: We will strive to ensure that AI benefits all students, regardless of their background or abilities. The guidelines will help us avoid bias and discrimination in AI systems.

Seeking Your Feedback: A Collaborative Approach

As we embark on this journey, we value the input of every member of our school community. We are currently in the process of drafting these guidelines and are seeking your valuable feedback. To ensure that they reflect the diverse perspectives and concerns of our community, we invite all staff, students, and parents to participate in a survey.

Your input is crucial to shaping the future of AI in our school, and we encourage open discussion and collaboration as we move forward. Please take a few moments to complete the survey, which will be distributed this coming week. Your insights will help us refine and tailor our guidelines to ensure the responsible and effective use of AI within our educational environment.

AI and Age Restrictions

At this time, I also seek to remind parents and guardians that some AI tools may have age restrictions. For example, ChatGPT currently requires users to be at least 13 years old and requires parental or legal guardian consent for students between the ages of 13 and 18. The website warns that "ChatGPT may produce output that is not appropriate for all audiences or all ages and educators should be mindful of that while using it with students or in classroom contexts." I encourage parents and carers to continue being vigilant around their child's use of technology.

Moving Forward

In closing, I would like to acknowledge the support of Mr Shane Abell in preparing the AI Survey instruments and for his guidance in the writing of this article. Learning alongside Shane and Ms Belinda Flood, we are looking forward to working with our Leaders of Learning, our teachers, students and wider community in creating a learning environment where AI technologies empower rather than replace the human aspects of education. We look forward to sharing our work and the survey results in coming weeks.

MINISTRY

October-November

In the Catholic Church October is the month of Mission, November we remember the Communion of Saints, and we look forward to the New Year in the Church's Liturgical Calander.

What makes us Christians is following Christ and mission month reminds us to carry out and continue the work of Jesus on Earth, and that the Gospel values need to be lived out. The Gospel reading (Mark 10:35-45) tells how the Son of Man himself did not come to be served but to serve. In the Gospel, Jesus challenges the disciples, and each one of us, to 'climb down the ladder to greatness'—to act and see differently. Jesus points out to disciples James and John; their ambition needs to be transformed into a humble ministry of service of others rather than a proud serving of self. Like the disciples we too are called to serve all—to be 'Christlike' in our actions, behaviour, and attitudes.

Overall, the Gospel reading speaks of Leadership – we are called to lead in some way, be it in our homes, the workplace, the classroom, in our community, in our sporting team or in the Church. Jesus reminds us that leadership is a call to service – to servant leadership (John 13). In Leadership for Mission let us rise to the challenge of mission and 'be witnesses of a life that has the flavour of the Gospel' (Pope Francis), greet one another as friends, share our skills and talents, build, and strengthen our relationships within the community and most importantly help those in need, especially 'those who cannot repay you.' (Luke 14:14).

As we commence the month of November, a month in the Catholic Church where traditionally we pray for the dead. Wednesday 1st, we celebrate the **Feast of All Saints** and Thursday 2nd the **Feast of All Souls**. On these days we remember the well-known saints such as St Mary, St Joseph, St Francis, St Mary Mackillop, St Paul, and St Patrick, but we also remember those who are not so well-known, but who lived a good Christian life and followed the ways of Jesus (the communion of Saints). Halloween, on Tuesday, has its origins in Ireland. The word **Halloween** is the abridged version of All Hallows Eve, All Hallows (Hallos) being the traditional name for All Saints Day. So, Halloween is the eve of All Saints Day, the day we celebrate the gift of all the saints. On, all Souls we remember and pray for those who have gone before us (who are a part of the communion of saints). Prayer is not just an individual act of worship. It is an act as part of a community of faith. Faith in a God who is a God of the living, not of the dead. In November we remember those who have gone before us.

The communion of saints is not just a doctrine but a living expression of who we are. "What is the Church if not the assembly of all the saints?" was an expression used in the early church. The communion of the saints means to be deeply connected. This is what we mean by 'communion'. It means that we are meant to live lives in which we find ourselves connected not only with our own family and friends, but connected to the family of humanity, and the family of all God's creatures. In all of this, it is Christ who is at the centre of this communion.

During November, as preparation for Advent, connect with this family through prayer.

For those within our St Mary's community who have lost a loved one in recent times, we keep you in our prayers.

Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May they rest in peace. Amen.

Dear Parents & Carers

You may be aware that I spoke with Year 7 at the end of Term 3 and early this term regarding students accessing inappropriate sexualized and violent content on their phones and showing this content to other students. As you can appreciate, this is a major breach of College expectations and clearly undermines the expectation of safety and respect inherent in the College mantra. Everyone within our community has the right to *Be Safe* and *Be Respected*. I have asked Year 7 students to contact me directly if they have been shown such content so that I am able to follow up with any involved person. I would like to thank those students who have had the courage to come forward with information. As a community we take breaches of the ICT agreement, that each parent and child signed at enrolment, very seriously and we will be working closely with system authorities to respond appropriately. The conversations that will continue to take place with Year 7 over Term 4 will be presented from an educative rather than punitive mindset.

For me as a parent, it is a timely reminder to have conversations with my own children and I strongly encourage you to do the same. It is our collective responsibility to ensure that our children are safe and behaving legally online. Please note that **it is illegal** under Australian law, to show pornography to a minor. Please ensure your child knows that if they are exposed to inappropriate material they can tell you or another trusted adult in their life.

We need to talk to our kids about pornography

t's ne fan to raise subjects that make your friends uncomfortable at a mothers' group catch-up. Mostly, we want to offlood sund share the microdramas of parenthood, work and life. We don't really want to be provoked. But I can't help myself. I need to talk about porn.

Have you ever seen Pornhub, I ask? The answer is prodominantly ahard "no". What about your husbands? Don't think so, they say. How does that work, I wonder. If there are billions of pretty deplorable videos watched every day, who's watching them?

This is so tabou. The grown-ups

dee't want to admit to using pornthat they don't want to acknowledge it may be causing problems for kide - and they cartainly don't want to talk about it to their children.

The evidence shows when hide have good education about one they were some





are at less risk of harm. Yet children say they don't have anyone to talk to about porn if their parents won't discuss it.

This seems to be the major issue preventing adults all over the Western world - stopping their kids accessing some of the grossest videos you could imagine and wiring their brain, exaulity and behaviours differently forever.

I'm not talking about adults' choices for themselves. I'm talking, hollering, about kids.

Experts such as Marce Crabbe from It's Time We Talked and clinicians, counsellers, teachers, church leaders, passure and hids degrading, often violent, and in no way reflective of what we want sex to be about for our children.

Professor Dale Tolliday runs a specialised service for children and their families.

Tasked him, "Has there been a change since the internet made this sexual content freely available to kids?" He replied unequivecally. Kids, he said, are using port younger and younger, and this is impacting behaviour in relationships in their teen years. There are quiet, diligent specialists working to prevent, heal, educate and help kids and their families, every day in every town in. Australia who will all tell you we need action before the outcomes of pora use in children becomes a public health problem.

Crabbe says young people are sharing again and again that pown sexuality in ways that harmnormalised aggression, coercion and unsafe sexual practices.

Recently, Britain took a giant leap by strengthening its Online Safety Bill, currently being debated in their perflament.

The new measures seek to hold top tech executives personally responsible for keeping children safe on their platforms. This includes the prospect of joil time for basses who full foul of the law.

"The tech industry...bave criticized sections of the Bill, particularly provisions that could be used to make messaging services break end-to-end energytion in order to scan for child abuse material," a Beuters report said.

those who profiteer from k. They, stong with those who use this kind of material, are preventing kids from being safe right now. They argue their rights are persmount, as if this is a zero-sum game.

"Age guting" is the solution, but they're not coming to the party.

If you have a child in your life, I challenge you to look at Pornhuis, to see what our children can see. We can't keep pretending, with categories like "schoolgir!", that this is not going to burt children. Lot's stop avoiding the issue before there's a public health epidemic. Kids need us. We can't let our discomfort prevent us from talking to them about something that may hurt them, either intentionally or unintentionally.

What to do if you see distressing content online

Online spaces should be safe for everyone, but you may sometimes come across content that is distressing – for example, because it depicts harm or violence.

Violent or pro-terror content may also be illegal.

Under Australian law, the eSafety Commissioner can issue a takedown notice to a platform to remove the content, or block access to protect Australian users from viewing this content.

If you see violent or terrorist content posted in a public place online, don't share it further even if your intention is to help or raise awareness. You may cause distress to others.

Report

If you see violent, distressing or harmful material, make a report to the platform or service where it is available. Reports to the service help get the material removed quickly. Your actions could protect you and others from seeing that content again.

If the material is not removed, or if it's seriously harmful, you can make a report online by visiting 'eSafety - how to make a report'.

Reports about terrorist and extreme violent content can also be made over telephone to the National Security Hotline on 1800 123 400.

Protect

Parents and carers may feel that they want to take extra precautions against their children seeing disturbing content online.

The eSafety Commissioner's website has helpful resources on how to get started with parental controls in social media, games, and apps and on devices. These controls can help parents restrict access to places online where there is a higher risk of seeing disturbing content.

There is also advice for young people on what they can do themselves.

Get help and support

If you or your child have seen disturbing content online, talking to someone can make it easier to decide what to do and how to deal with its impact.
