Principal's Message

Dear Parents/Carers and Community Members

Our calling as "A Resurrection People"

Saturday, 25 March was the Feast of the Annunciation, when Mary said 'YES' to be the Mother of Jesus. The Sisters of St Joseph blessed our College with the name St Mary's (of the Annunciation). This is our College feast day, and our motto, 'Ready to Serve' is the echo of Mary's 'YES', to be ready to serve. Our feast day is a day when, like Mary, the Mother of Jesus, we are challenged to answer our calling as followers of Christ, "to be ready to serve" the poor, the destitute, those bereft of love and hope, the down-trodden and persecuted in our world.

Testing times!

Well not really ... just a lot of tests!

Yes, Term One, has been a "testing time" – NAPLAN for Years 7 and 9 students, Year 10 Minimum Standards and the Year 7 CoGAT assessments. We also have completed a series of PAT tests in reading for many of our Year 7 students. So, why all the tests?

Assessment tools, such as those like NAPLAN and Minimum Standard Tests, allow for national and state collection of data in areas such as Numeracy, Reading, Writing, Grammar and Punctuation. These tests enable planning at both a MACRO (that is, at the National/State/System level eg. in areas such as funding and policy) as well as the MICRO (where schools can use the data collected to assess where students are at in these basic skills, adjust programming, design intervention strategies and build pedagogical practice that will facilitate growth in each student). At St Mary's we use the data collected from these assessments to assist us in "knowing" our students, enabling us to plan strategies such as extension activities, remediation, literacy support and cross-faculty strategies such as spelling and non-fiction writing. In short, the snapshot of the student from each of these tests, coupled with evidence collected throughout the daily teaching cycle, enables us to determine the best way possible to enrich student learning and build growth in areas that need development.

So, yes, "testing" times – but what a tremendous effort from all our students and teachers. The behaviour of all students - their conduct, maturity and willingness to "be their best" - has impressed all teachers and we are incredibly proud of each and every student. I'd also like to thank the teaching staff for their support of the processes, the Support staff for the organisation of such things as setting up the hall and testing rooms, creating and compiling testing slips, organising additional technology support etc and, finally, those who primarily had oversight of the tests

– Mrs Michelle Van Vlimmeren (NAPLAN), Mrs Louise Henderson (CoGAT), the English Faculty (PAT) and Mr Daniel
 Beckett (MS Testing). We are deeply grateful to all involved in supporting these assessments. Thank you!

Students have been informed that they are **expected to lead this conversation** and they will be provided with a series of questions to guide this discussion. The guiding questions are:

- What am I learning?
- Why am I learning this?
- How am I doing?
- How do I know?
- How can I improve?
- Where can I go for help?

We trust that the information contained within the report is found to be useful and that the meeting with teachers proves to be very beneficial for your child. The College remains committed to the strong partnerships between school and home and we look forward to seeing you this week.

Finally, please note that on Friday 31st March classes for our Year 12 students will continue as per the timetable. Year 7-11 students will only attend school on this day at the time of their interviews. There will be no supervision provided to 7-11 students on this day.

Learning in Legal Studies

Matthew Coates, Crown Prosecutor from ODPP, presented to Year 11 and Year 12 Legal Studies this term. Students were privileged to be part of this presentation which has enhanced their understanding of the Criminal Trial process.

On Monday 27th March both classes visited the Drug Court in Toronto. I (Mrs Murray) have been teaching for many years and in my opinion this is one of the most worth worthwhile life experiences that any high school student can have. One message from the Drug Court Judge when he addressed the students was, that all the people in Court today have one regret and that is they wish they had never tried Drugs.

Following are student reflections from the day:

- Visiting the Drug Court was an important experience as it allowed us to see the diversity of people who are affected by drugs and addiction. Listening to their insights as they entered the court helped me to empathise with people who I would normally ignore or avoid.
- This excursion opened my eyes to alternative sentencing methods that solely focus on the best interests of the participant (offender) and it was important to see how the government is putting in immense effort to help and support drug-dependant individuals- Annelise Jeske
- The excursion to the drug court allowed me to get an insight on how offenders are dealt with and how the court balances the rights of the offender and the safety of the wider community.
- The Drug Court excursion provided great insight into a method that has the safety of the community as a priority but also considers the rights of the individual. I found that it was an experience that showed the necessity of addressing the issues we observe with drugs at the root of the problem, which is addiction.
- Our excursion to the drug court was very insightful and allowed us to view the workings of the legal system up close as we saw the personal impact of drugs on not only individuals but their friends and family as well. This excursion tied into the criminal trial process and crime as a topic.

GIFTED EDUCATION

Congratulations to all the students from Year 7 and 8 who completed their CogAT testing this week. CogAT measures learned reasoning abilities in 3 areas:

- Verbal Reasoning abilities to use search, retrieval and comparison processes
- Quantitative Thinking abilities to reason about patterns and relationships
- Nonverbal Reasoning abilities to use spatial and configurative content

This testing is used across the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle and will highlight areas of student strength, areas where assistance may be needed and areas where students may show gifts or talent.

It was great to see everyone doing their best to answer tricky questions outside of their comfort zone. You could hear the cogs turning as students put their thinking skill to the test. The students are to be commended on their positive attitude as well as their willingness to challenge themselves.

Students who have not yet completed CogAT testing will have a chance to sit the exam before the end of term.
