"Come Follow Me"

During the past 51 years of my ministry in Catholic education in the Diocese of Maitland-Newcastle, I have been gifted with countless graces which have contributed to a rich and fulfilling professional and personal life. My sense of gratitude and heartfelt thanks for this blessing is immense.

In January 1973, the late Fr James (Jim) Saunders, invited me to share in the teaching of Economics to senior students at St Anne's High School and St Pius X College, Adamstown. I accepted the offer. At that time, while I did not fully understand nor appreciate the implications of my decision to become a Catholic school educator, I have never had any regrets, and there never was a day when I did not want to go to school.

During my career, I have been privileged to serve as a classroom teacher at St Pius X College and St Anne's High School Adamstown; Social Science Coordinator at St Pius X College, Adamstown; Deputy Principal at St Pius X College, Adamstown (1980-1984); Assistant Principal at St Mary's High School Gateshead (1984-1989), Assistant Principal at St Paul's Booragul High School (1990), and for 33 years as Principal at St Clare's High School, Taree (1991-2003) and St Mary's High School/Catholic College, Gateshead (2004-2023).

I have been so very fortunate to have spent 38 of my 51 years as a Servant Leader in school communities which have had their foundational roots embedded in the tradition of the Josephite Sisters from Lochinvar. I have a deep love and admiration for the sisters on account of their remarkable contribution to Catholic education, and the positive influence they have had on my personal and professional life as a Catholic school educator.

They are committed to "educating for life for all", and displaying unwavering fidelity to gospel values which permeate the life of the communities they have laboured tirelessly to establish. It has been an absolute privilege to walk in their footsteps. To be taught by them; to have taught alongside them; to learn from the quality of their life and witness; to be 'in community' with them and draw strength from their courage of endurance, audacity, steadfast commitment, and fidelity to a way of life seeking what Jesus sought – equality, peace, justice, compassion and all-inclusive love.

Today, our college is characterised by relationships which are life-giving, life-promoting and life-affirming. These are a product of the presence and actions of community members, past and present, especially the Sisters of St Joseph, Lochinvar. They established what our community stands for today. Their lives embodied, and continue to embody, what community members must continue to value today and into the future. That is, our existence as a Christ-centred place.

A place honouring our Catholic tradition and Josephite heritage. A place of compassionate care where relationships come first. A place focussed on learners (students, teachers, parents) and their learning. A generative place committed to becoming more than we currently are as people, and as people in a Christ-centred community giving life to and receiving life from each other.

A positive school culture is integral to students' success in their learning. It gifts students with a deep sense of belonging and connectedness and builds relational trust between community members. It is the dedication and commitment of staff (teacher support and teaching) which continues to nurture this culture.

It has been a privilege to be engaged in a school culture where the staff have fully embraced the role of learner and strive each day for improvement in their practice in order to ensure ongoing improvement in students' educational outcomes. Their commitment to sharing and collaborating; to learning from their daily practice; to learning together from the latest educational research, especially as it relates to the science of learning is changing the learning environment in the school in a way that is more appropriately responsive to the needs of the 21st century adolescent learner. It is continuing to improve students' engagement in learning and building their much-needed capacity to be lifelong learners.

The staff are also commended for prioritising relationships and nurturing a climate where our students continue to experience the reality of God's love in the relationships, processes and procedures operating around them. It is to their credit that gospel values permeate the lived curriculum of the college and the taught curriculum of the classroom.

There is much I will miss about daily college life, none more so than our students. St Mary's is a unique and special place, and the essence of these qualities is found in our students. They give our lives meaning. They gift us as educators with the joy, the challenges, the struggles, and frustration of the adolescents' search for identity as they journey to adulthood. They define the character of our college. To witness and share in their daily struggles and endeavours, and to experience their capacity, to uplift, inspire and give expression to the finest qualities of our humanity have been special blessings. I will miss their daily greetings, their smiles, the banter, the conversations and the opportunities to share with them in activities such as the RU OK Day, the Colour Run, the Push-Up Challenge, sporting events and fund-raising activities for charitable organisations and needy causes such as St Vincent de Paul, CARITAS Australia and Catholic Mission. To be an educator of adolescents has been a truly privileged role. It has gifted me with so many life-giving memories for which I am so grateful.

During my time in Catholic education, and especially in the past 20 years at St Mary's, I never cease to be amazed by the generosity of spirit and compassion embodied in the countless expressions of selfless giving and sacrifices which parents/carers have made and continue to make in support of their children's education and the ongoing growth and development of our college community. Parents/carers - I thank you for this and for entrusting your children to our care and supporting them, their teachers and our support staff in a spirit of mutual love, care, understanding and relational trust. I am especially mindful and ever so grateful for the mighty efforts made to meet the financial costs of educating your children, especially in challenging economic times like the present; and for volunteering your services in the various dimensions of college life and, especially, in the Cafeteria.

To be called to share, with so any others, in the creative work of God at St Mary's, Gateshead, has been a special blessing. It has been an honour and sacred privilege, during the past 20 years and times before, to share in the human stories of so many individuals and families. To hear a little of your stories, to share in your pain, to learn of and witness your struggles, to experience the depth of your anguish in times of loss, to delight in your joys, to experience your care, love and support and to receive your words of encouragement have been most enriching and humbling experiences. They have gifted me with a deeper appreciation of my humanity and a greater awareness of our loving God's presence in my life. I thank you for this.

To be a servant leader at a time of profound and fundamental change in society, the church and education has been challenging and demanding but nevertheless a most rewarding, fulfilling and growth promoting experience for which I am ever so grateful and thankful.

My intention as a servant leader has been to make a positive difference in the lives of people I have been called to serve. I have strived to do this by seeking what Jesus sought – equality, justice and all-inclusive love; by prioritising relationships, and by doing my best to empower students and members of staff to be the best versions of themselves as people, and as people called to share their God given gifts and talents in service of others and our world. I trust this has been so.

Sincere thanks and gratitude from family members and myself for the wonderful retirement ceremony held last Friday. It has been an absolute privilege to be called to the role of a servant leader in the St Mary's community.

A Snapshot of Larry Keating's Farewell



MINISTRY

As part of Advent preparations, many of us will have put up our Christmas decorations, complete with the Christmas Crib, which is a Franciscan tradition, dating back to 1223. Perhaps, like me, you put the figure of the baby Jesus in the manger on Christmas Eve, having contemplated during Advent the Annunciation and devotion of Mary and Joseph to the God who called them to be faithful to each other, their child and their God. Despite the complexity of their circumstances Mary and Joseph seem to live out the command in the Psalms to "Rejoice! . . . The Lord is near. Have no anxiety at all," They live out the call to be joyful, without fear for the future. Mary herself lives in the angel's affirmation to not be afraid for she has found favour with God.



In 1223 that first crib was celebrated in the woods of Greccio near Assisi, on Christmas Eve. St Francis had asked a townsman, John (Messier Giovanni Velitta), about two weeks before Christmas to prepare a manger, complete with donkey and ox. Franciscans from various communities, women, and men of the neighbourhood, bought candles and torches to brighten the night and celebrated with St Francis.

The word 'manger' comes from the French word the French manger (meaning "to eat"), from Latin mandere (meaning "to chew"). It is quite appropriate that during that Christmas celebrations are centred around a festive table, with friends and family gathered from far and wide to honour the season of giving by chewing over the events of the past year with laughter and sometimes tears, but always with thankfulness.

The manger and the Eucharist have both chewing and gratitude in common. The word "Eucharist" means "giving thanks," but in a Jewish context is directed specifically towards giving thanks to God. At the manger we contemplate the God made flesh and give thanks for his incarnation. At our own family tables are we also conscious of the child whose birth we are celebrating?

The manger we contemplate calls us to adore the Christ who will become the bread of life. This manger with its gathering of shepherds and kings, the unschooled and the educated, the unclean and the pure, the believers and the sceptical has become a table around which a great celebration occurs, where dialogue can take place and where real community is lived and nurtured.

The child whose birth is celebrated in Isaiah 9:6: "For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." Unlike the Holy of Holies in the Temple, the entrance, which was restricted to the High Priest, this child invites all into his presence.

May this child of the manger, who inspires us to gather around our family tables at Christmas, bless us with the grace to live in love, hope, joy and peace. May he inspire us to rejoice and transform the world.

Advent God, Create in our hearts a longing for peace, May we create Peace within families May we create Peace within communities May we create Peace within the state May we create Peace within the world Advent God, May we listen to you in the silence. And stillness of your love May your peace be our protection May we be strengthened to be your prophetic voice May we reject violence in all its forms The violence wrought by fear and poverty of spirit the violence of unexamined personal power and privilege the violence of exclusion the violence of oppression the violence of neglect Teach us to be makers of peace Resolvers of conflict Conquerors of injustice covering battle grounds with the lush growth of just peace.





How do we Safeguard our Students

At St Mary's we place safety of our students at the core of how we plan, think and act. The Diocese has a positive obligation to reduce the risk of abuse to children derived from law and regulation.

Our Diocese has to ensure we comply with 2 sets of standards, both derived from the Royal Commission into Institutional Historic Child Sexual abuse. This includes the NSW Child Safe Standards and the National Catholic Safeguarding Standards (NCSS).

In November 2023, our Diocese, including a number of schools, were subject to an audit in relation to our compliance to meet the NCSS. Results will be published early 2024.

The ways in which our school meets these standards include:

• Our staff Code of Conduct and Commitment Statement is displayed on our website and posters in our school for transparency and to ensure that we all embrace a safeguarding culture, emphasising that safeguarding is everyone's responsibility.

• We have a Safeguarding Promoter in our school whose role it is to monitor compliance and risk and promote all things safeguarding as a priority.

- We educate our students about safe relationships, protective behaviours and ensure they understand their human rights.
- Our Student Representative Council (SRC) allows students to have a voice and be heard.
- We encourage parents to have a voice through our PEG meetings.
- Parents and students have access to support information via SchoolTV on our website.
- Equity is promoted and diversity is respected in our school through education and special events .
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Right people, right role, right knowledge

- Our staff undertake mandatory safeguarding training.
- Our staff regularly undertake professional development as well as invite external speakers into the school to discuss safeguarding topics to students and staff including online safety, bullying, trauma informed practice etc.
- Our are supported in their roles, especially new staff.
- Our school follows Diocesan student placement protocols and procedures.

- We promote all Safeguarding policies by ensuring they are communicated with families on our websites and through our communication channels.
- Our classrooms, counselling rooms and other areas in the school are safe spaces with visibility from the outside but does not compromise our students right to privacy and wellbeing.
- We have an effective complaints management system in place, with students and families having a variety of avenues to provide feedback or complaints.

Criteria: Lyrics and/or music reflect the category theme. Quality and creative use of musical concepts e.g. melody, chords, structure, rhythm and dynamics. Interesting and engaging song.

Once entries close, shortlisted finalists will have the opportunity to workshop their song with professional musicians and ASPIRE Musical Director. The winner for each category will be decided at a live concert where a guest panel will judge the songs. This year there will be 4 winners, one for each category (Primary - Individual, Primary - Class, Years 7-9 and Years 10-12). The prize is a \$300 Musos Corner voucher and have their song professionally recorded.

Conditions: Music and lyrics must be created by the nominated students. Some students, particularly classes and younger students, may use backing tracks, or samples they have arranged themselves, but must create the lyrics themselves. Some students may seek feedback from their teachers or tutors, but the final product must be the student's own work. Submissions may be lyrics and music, or music only. Artificial Intelligence is not to be used in any aspect of the work submitted. The quality of the performance/recording will not impact selection.
