Principal's Message

Dear Parents, Carers and Community Members,

Catching the Good

Often, as humans, we tend to focus on the negative, particularly when we receive messages of negativity or complaint. We fixate on the problems, we worry over where people went wrong and it is easy to only hear the noise of the troubles and things that need fixing.

Sometimes, as parents and educators, it is easy to do the same with the children in our care – and with ourselves. We see the problems, the failures, the part of others that are less than perfect. We dwell on words and actions that didn't quite come out right. We read into situations, criticise self and others, sometimes losing sight of the good that surrounds us.

At assembly this week, we reflected on this very aspect of what it is to be human. Yes, it is easy to get lost in the negative, the poor choices made, getting bogged down in what needs to be fixed or how we can improve – and, yes, this needs to happen. However, this week we chose to take time out to "catch the good" and to celebrate.

Our students have represented us in recent weeks with pride, exemplary in behaviour and attitude. Our teachers have returned from activities such as the recent Year 10 bstreetsmart excursion and the Netball Championships, speaking in glowing terms of our students in terms of their respectful conduct, their engagement, and their collaboration with staff. Many of our Year 8 students recently partnered with St Paul's Gateshead Primary School to attend Parish mass and celebrate the Feast Day of Mary Mackillop; four of our Year 10 students recently attended the Josephite Risk and Dare Conference, demonstrating excellent leadership; our community recently received a Certificate of Appreciation from St Vincent de Paul for our support of their ongoing work in the community. Each of these activities are acts of service, freely given by our students in partnership with our staff. And, rightly so, they should be acknowledged and celebrated. It is a privilege to be able to give public recognition to each of these groups of students – to say thank you for representing us so well and for holding so well to our college Motto – Ready to Serve, and to our mantra – Be Safe, Be Respectful, Be a Learner.

Our next challenge is to continue to work for good, to grow and to become even better people in all that we do. How do we do this? Yes, we reflect, we address the negative and the times we get things wrong but ... we must also take time, as parents, educators, friends and colleagues, to "catch the good".

It means being specific in our praise, at the time of seeing something done well.

It means acknowledging effort as well as kindness, responsibility, and respect.

It means taking the time to give self-praise when you recognise a positive in your own life.

It means setting time aside to specifically provide feedback when seeing something positive in someone. Take the time to tell someone, "I've noticed ...".

So, yes, it's easy to criticise, to make judgement, to chastise – but to "catch the good", to affirm what is positive, that is truly powerful, hope-filled, and life-giving.

In closing, to our students, parents, and staff, I say thank you. Thank you for all that you give and do for our community. Let's keep both practising and catching the good in each other so that we may become better human beings in relationship with God, self, and others.

As we move into the End of Course Examination period, we would like to inform you of the processes that are implemented at St Mary's. We ask that you please engage with the frequently asked questions outlined below. It is also important that this document be read in conjunction with the Instructions found on Page 3 of the Year 11 Examination Timetable, and the Year 11 Assessment Handbook, available in the student portal.

FAQs

Do I need to attend school on days I do not have an exam?

You do NOT need to attend school on days that you do not have an exam during the exam block. The exam block starts on Monday 4th September and concludes on Friday 15th September. Classes resume on Monday 18th September.

Students attending school **outside of exam times** are expected to use the **Library (or Study L7)** for private study.

NB YOU MUST SIGN IN AT STUDENT SERVICES IF ON CAMPUS (Other than for the exam period).

What time do I arrive before my exam?

Students are expected to assemble outside The Josephite Centre for each session at least 15 minutes prior to the commencement of exams. All study and reference materials, as well as prohibited items (including phones and Apple watches), need to be stored in the student's bag or the basket provided for mobile phones and keys. These items will be stored securely during each examination and returned at the conclusion of each session. Students are encouraged to bring only a small bag on exam days. This storage space will be in D1.

What should I do if I am sick or suffer a misadventure on the day of an examination and I can't attend school?

- 1. Please notify Student Services and your teacher/Leader of Learning via email or phone 49444800 **before** 8:00 am
- 2. Students are required to complete and email an IM Application (available on the Student Portal), as well as emailing a copy of a medical certificate and/or other valid supportive documentation. IM Applications (Green Forms) need to be emailed ASAP to belinda.flood@mn.catholic.edu.au
- If you are unsure what qualifies as supporting documentation, please email belinda.flood@mn.catholic.edu.au for further information.

What happens if I am unwell just before or during my exam?

You will need to inform Ms Flood, Mr Cushan or the Examination Supervisor that you are unwell so that they can monitor and assist you. If you believe your exam performance was affected, you can submit an IM but will first need to obtain a Medical Certificate to email with your application. Your IM application should state the symptoms you were affected with during the exam and how these impacted on your exam performance.

What if I am unwell prior to my exams and cannot study for them?

The IM Process does NOT include loss of preparation or study time for examinations. This follows NESA processes that do not allow Illness and Misadventure applications for this reason.

Will my examinations be rescheduled if I am unwell/absent?

You will be required to complete the examination either during the exam block or when you return to school. Please engage with Ms Flood regarding this process, so that a new time can be rescheduled.

What do I bring into the exam?

You are required to bring spare pencils, pens and all other necessary equipment (NESA Approved Calculator) in a clear plastic sleeve/container to each examination. You are able to bring a clear water bottle without labels.

Please ensure you wear your **FULL SCHOOL UNIFORM** to each examination.

Notable mentions go to Jace C, Fletcher O and Jye S.


Unfortunately, due to their for-and-against, the team were unable to progress to the next stage of the tournament (falling 1 try short of the required amount).



INSTRUMENTAL AUDITION

Monday 23 October 2023

All instrumental auditions are 10 minutes. You are required to prepare a short piece that you feel shows your ability. After performing your piece for the panel, you will either be given some sight reading, then asked to perform some scales or asked to improvise around some chords accompanied by another instrument.

DRAMA AUDITION

Tuesday 24 October and Wednesday 25 October 2023

The drama auditions are comprised of a half hour workshop comprising of a series of drama exercises in movement, voice, character work and devising (creating short scenes). Students will also be required to prepare a short one-minute monologue. A list of topics for Junior applicants will be on the ASPIRE website from Week 7 of Term 3, whilst Senior applicants will be required to source a monologue of their choice.

VOCAL AUDITION

Thursday 26 October 2023

For the one-hour vocal audition, you will be placed in a group of up to 20 students of similar age. The first part of the audition will comprise learning a new song as a group and some simple movement to go with it. This allows us to see how well you pick up new music, lyrics and movement and place them together, but it will also be fun! In the second half of the audition everyone will be required to sing the first verse and chorus of one of the ten selected songs. The list of songs will be available on the ASPIRE website at the end of term 3 2022. You will be required to sing with the backing track (we provide). Perpetual Day of Remembrance: The story so far.

Our response emerges from our understanding of who we are as a Church community. St Paul articulated it this way: when 'one member suffers in the body of Christ which is the Church, all the members suffer with that member' (1 Cor 12:26).

As a people of faith, commissioned by Jesus to live in remembrance of him, we know the importance of remembering. Our remembering not only functions to ensure that such abuse never happens again, more than that, it is penetrated with the light of Christ's Paschal Mystery and so becomes the source of our ongoing conversation and hope. Together we can be a sign of hope.



2017

Following Lina's Project in 2015 - a project of atonement that was facilitated by the diocese - Bishop Bill
Wright established September 15 as a Perpetual Day of Remembrance throughout the diocese with two
components: a survivor-led event and a prayer response.



2018

- Resources were provided to all parishes for the celebration of Mass on Sunday September 16.
- The focus was on Mass at the Sacred Heart Cathedral.

2019

- The Diocesan Liturgy Council established a Working Party to develop the Church's prayer response.
- Ongoing collaboration with Zimmerman Service Healing and Support, the Office of Safeguarding and the Bishop's Office.
- The Church's prayer response was named Shine the light of Christ.
- Three resources were developed: for parishes, for schools, agencies and groups, and for individuals and households.



2020

- The establishment of the 'Perpetual Day of Remembrance and National Child Protection Week Coordinating Committee', to facilitate collaborative planning of both events.
- The COVID-19 pandemic. Without the opportunity to gather people acknowledged the day as was most appropriate for them.
- A significant development was Bishop William Wright's <u>decree</u> inscribing *Perpetual Day of Remembrance Sunday* into the diocesan liturgical calendar and the accompanying explanatory <u>note</u>.
- A focus group was held with a selection of school principals.





- Focus was on the promotion of the Bishop's Healing Fund.
- COVID-19 continued to impact our prayer and worship response.
- The resources continued to be developed in response to feedback.

2022



- Marked five years since the establishment of 15 September as the Perpetual Day of Remembrance.
- Additional resources, including the Stations of the Cross and a recording of the hymn 'We Sing for those whose Song is Silent' by John Bell, were provided.
- In response to survivor initiative a musical work titled "The Innocents" (by David Banney) was commissioned.
